



Why evaluation feedback can be helpful

- Gather feedback directly from participants as you plan or follow up about an experience
- Make informed changes to activities and offerings
- Determine whether project goals are being met





Aspects that are important to keep in mind

- Think carefully about what information you need and why
- Remember that open-ended data often requires more analysis on your part and more effort on the part of the participant
- It's hard to gather data about the future, and we are in the middle of an evolving situation





Methods for gathering feedback

- Various survey platforms offer free, limited versions
 - SurveyGizmo
 - Survey Monkey
 - Google Forms

- Virtual platforms may have options for feedback
 - Zoom allows for polls with multiple choice options and also URL redirects
 - Social media platforms also have poll options and capacities



Methods for gathering feedback

- Build feedback mechanisms into your experience
 - Can you ask them anything ahead of time when they register?
 - What can you **observe** during the program?
 - What types of responses are people **sharing in real time** to your programmatic questions?
 - What do people ask during the program or put in the chats?
 - Can you leave a specific amount of time for a short conversation about what people liked or feel could be improved?

What simple material can inspire both creative expressive works of art and scientific observations about the liquid and solid states of matter? Paint-sicles!

Paint-sicles are colored ice cubes. They may be simple to make, but exploring with them can generate all kinds of sensory, art, and science discoveries. They can also be adapted in many ways to better suit your family's needs.
